# From the Chairman

September 2009

Dear Alumni, Parents and Friends,

It gives me great pleasure to welcome you to the Annual Report on Giving, a summary of the past year's fundraising activities carried out by the school's Development Office on behalf of the Board of Governors.

Giving to Hutchesons' is a vital component of the school's continuing success and long term financial stability. Fee income alone cannot pay for everything that is required to keep Hutchesons' at the forefront of education in Scotland therefore it is essential that we establish and maintain a genuine culture of philanthropy within our school community. This financial support assists our Board of Governors in their purpose to invest in every aspect of school life - providing the best teaching resources, sustaining a programme of continuous improvements to our classrooms, developing our sports, music and art facilities, and maintaining our two campuses - whilst continuing to keep our fees at a reasonable level.

We are extremely grateful to everyone who gives to Hutchesons', whether it is a monthly donation to the Annual Fund, a gift towards a Bursary, a bequest or legacy left in a will, or a single donation to a capital project. Every gift is important to us and makes a huge difference to the Board's ability to deliver our programme of investment and to plan ahead for the future.

This year I am delighted to report that we have received a total of £580,000 and on behalf of the Board of Governors, the staff and the pupils at Hutchesons' I would like to thank all our donors who made a gift to the school.

The bedrock of our non-fee income is the Hutchesons' Annual Fund, an ongoing programme of regular giving which this year raised a total of £120,000. It may surprise you to learn that the majority of our Annual Fund donors give gifts of £100 per year or less and most pay by monthly standing order. Gifts to the Annual Fund are especially effective because they are unrestricted and we can apply the funds immediately, which makes this a powerful form of giving. Anyone can make a gift to the Annual Fund and its strength lies in the wide base of its supporters.

We are extremely fortunate to have support from Hutchesonians from all around the world. Our friends in Canada and the US are particularly loyal and continue to give generously year after year. We highlight two such friends, Martina Thomson Hislop and Kevin Sneader, in this report and I hope you enjoy reading about them. In the autumn the Rector Dr Ken Greig will be visiting New York to launch the new US Hutchesons' Charitable Trust. This is a major step forward and it is hoped that it will encourage tax efficient donations from our alumni and friends in North America.

Further afield, our hockey team has just completed their first visit to Australia where they played a number of matches which were attended by several Hutchie alumni who cheered our girls in true Scottish style. The Hutchie family is never too far away.

A large number of our donors give to Bursaries and thanks to their generosity, and particularly that of the major donors who so generously support full Bursaries, we have been able to increase significantly the amount of fee assistance we can offer to academically bright pupils from less advantaged backgrounds. The award of Bursaries is very much embedded in the ethos of Hutchesons' and remains a proud tradition of our school.

In June we welcomed Graham MacAllister as the new Hon President of the 1641 Society at the annual lunch which was attended by a record 75 guests. At the Lunch we launched our new Legacy Campaign to promote membership of the Society and to encourage anyone who is in the process of drawing up their will to think about including a gift to the school. The campaign has been met with wide approval and already we have increased the number of members of the Society to 85, well on our way to our goal of one hundred members. During the year we received the final instalment of a very significant legacy from the estate of the late Mrs Helen Hope Hood, together with further legacies from the estates of the late Hester Doreen Crichton, née Barr (C1937) and the late James Ferguson (C1931) totalling over £100,000. Thanks to their thoughtful generosity future generations of Hutchesons' pupils will benefit.

The capital campaign to build a new Astro turf Hockey Pitch and Athletics Track at Beaton Road continued throughout the year with intense fundraising effort. The glittering Going for Gold Ball in March raised over £30,000 and the Track of Honour fundraising programme raised over £330,000, making the total amount raised over £360,000. I think this is a commendable result given the short timescale of the project and the challenging economic situation which has affected us all.


I am delighted to report that Mrs Alix Stevenson, née Jamieson (C1960) has accepted our invitation to name the new facilities, in recognition of her outstanding past sporting achievements. Alix won the Frances Barker Shield for the leading female athlete in the Scottish School championship no fewer than three times, in 1957, 1959 and 1960, more than any other schoolgirl. Alix was seven times Scottish Long Jump champion between 1960 and 1970, and held Scottish records in the 100 yards and 80 metre hurdles. In 1964 Alix represented Great Britain in the Olympic Games in Tokyo. We are very proud of such a talented alumna and we are delighted that the new facilities will be called The Alix Jamieson Stadium. Work on the new stadium has been progressing throughout the summer and is scheduled for completion in the late autumn when it will be officially opened by Mrs Stevenson.

I have greatly enjoyed meeting many of you at various school events and reunions, especially at the Burns Supper at the Caledonian Club in London in January, Founders' Day in Glasgow Cathedral in March, and at the House of Lords Lunch in May, so kindly hosted once more by Lord McColl (C1951). It is always a great pleasure to meet fellow Hutchesonians and I look forward to meeting many more of you in the coming year.

On behalf of everyone at Hutchesons' I would like to extend my warmest thanks to all our donors for their kind and generous gifts- every donor is acknowledged in the centre of the report - and to those who are not yet donors I would urge you to give serious consideration to making this the year you make your first gift to the school. With the support of everyone in the Hutchie community we can go on with confidence and achieve wonderful things for our school and for our pupils.

## Going for Gold

Parents, alumni, staff and friends have raised over £360,000 towards the Going for Gold campaign to build a new international hockey pitch and athletics track at Beaton Road. ## Kingarth Street Library

The Kingarth Street Library was formally opened on 10 March 2008 by Dr June I Gow (C1950) following a two-year fundraising campaign, to which many parents, alumni and staff contributed over £100,000. Dr Gow was the inspiration behind this fantastic project which was nominated for a design award and is now a much loved feature of the Primary School.



## Sir Alexander Stone Memorial

In 2007 Lady Bette Stone unveiled a fine statue which she had specially commissioned to commemorate the life of her late husband Sir Alexander Stone (C1924). Together with Sir Alexander, Lady Stone has been a most generous benefactor to the school, donating over the years the unique John K Clark windows in the Library, the Music Practice Suite in the Fotheringay Centre, and the fine Bösendorfer Grand Piano, which the renowned pianist Stephen Hough will play at a recital in Pollok House on 4 December 2009. Lady Stone continues this legacy of philanthropy to the school through the annual Sir Alexander Stone Memorial Lecture, which this session will be delivered by Alexander Stoddart, Sculptor in Ordinary to The Queen in Scotland on 5 February 2010.

# The 1641 Society Legacy Fund

## A Foundation for the Future

Hutchesons' Grammar School has produced a wealth of distinguished men and women who have made a considerable contribution to our society in many different walks of life.

Martina Thomson Hislop (C1945) is one of our most loyal supporters and although she has lived in Toronto for over 50 years she stills feels great affection for her old school. During one of Graham MacAllister's visits to FPs in Canada, when talking about today's school, he explained that one of the fundamentals of a Hutchesons' education was to encourage all our pupils to develop a love of learning with the desire to continue learning for life. This struck a real chord with Martina who then asked how she could help. Not only has Martina left a significant legacy to Hutchesons' but she has also made a great gift in her lifetime by endowing the Martina Thomson Hislop Bursary which finances one pupil each year. We are deeply honoured to have her as a friend.

Graham W A MacAllister (C1962) is Hon. President of The 1641 Society. He retired from Hutchesons' in 2008 following a 40-year teaching career at the School, latterly as Senior Depute Rector.



## Martina Thomson Hislop

During the years Martina spent at Hutchesons' the highlight was the unique experience of her time at Milton Park where a senior class of just six pupils afforded individual attention. "Domestic science with cooking and sewing, and learning how to keep our rooms clean and tidy! Nature walks, bicycle rides, tennis and typing" she recalls.

As an only child, more than anything she learned how to share and live with other people. Her school years gave her a great thirst for knowledge which has stayed with her throughout her life. Business College followed, then a position in the Library at King's College at the University of Durham. The obvious next step was to study for her librarian's degree. This was interrupted when she and her husband decided to emigrate to Canada in 1954 where she very quickly gained a position in the Library at the University of Toronto. Books, particularly for research, remain a passion to this day.

Elegant and impeccably dressed, Martina has always been interested in the fashion

business, designing and making most of her own clothes. She became a successful fashion model and set up her own company producing and presenting fashion shows. An accomplished photographer Martina went on to establish a thriving photography business, "Martina Thomson Photography". Her awards have given her a lifetime membership in the prestigious Toronto Camera Club and, as a story teller at heart, she still enjoys giving illustrated talks using her travel pictures to tell the story of a country and its people - always with a touch of Scottish humour.

Travel has also played a major role in Martina's life. Her greatest adventure was at the sprightly age of 62 when, with an open ticket and no reservations, she flew to Australia and back-packed through the South Pacific islands for five months.

Martina has always been active in sports and this year had her 40th anniversary celebration as a member of the same health club where she exercises five times a week. This, she says, is the secret of her long life!

"The bottom line is that pupils from Hutchie are going out all over the world and doing things that really matter and which make a real difference. When I wrote to the Governors to let them know I was leaving my estate to the school, I told them I was doing this for the school, because my years there taught me so much."

# The Hutchesons' Annual Fund

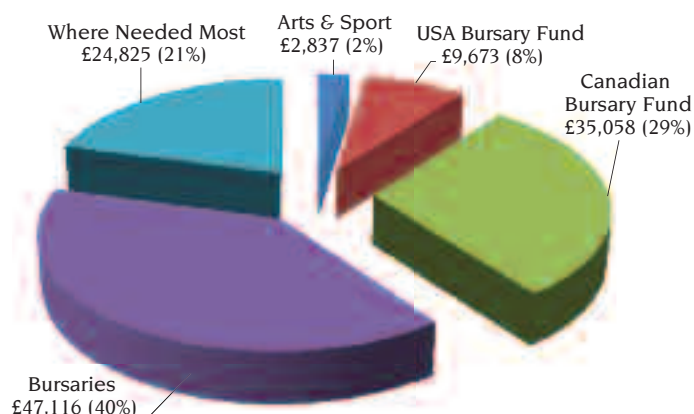
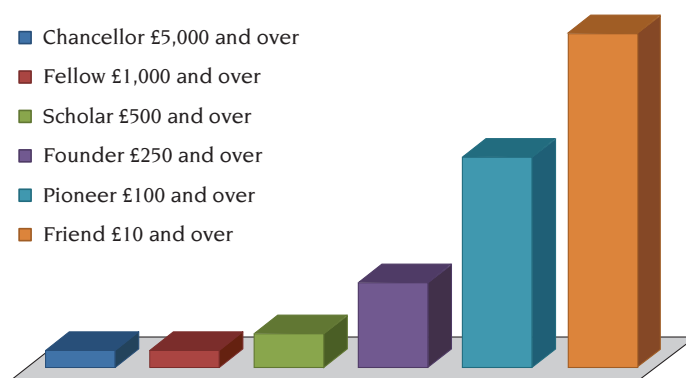
Giving to the Annual Fund each year makes a significant difference to the lives of our pupils and to the future growth and stability of the school.
