Hutchesons'?

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Welcome Rector

Media interest in a school like Hutchesons' is sometimes intense, but not always for the right reasons. Despite our many efforts, there are a number of fairly persistent myths about us still doing the rounds. It is all the more pleasing therefore when we are the subject of positive newspaper stories, which do accurately reflect our ethos and the laudable achievements of pupils and staff. Being chosen by the Sunday Times as their 'Scottish Independent School of the Year' is a good example of that, and it has made everyone in the school community feel rightly proud. The lengthy article explaining why we were chosen also went a long way towards dispelling some of the myths. I was particularly pleased when the editor told me it was the volume of Higher and Advanced Higher/A level entries coupled with the quality of the grades achieved that stood out with Hutchesons'. That particular statistic (number of presentations per candidate) says a lot about our pupils' commitment to academic study, and shows that the 'cool to be clever' culture is real. We currently have 42 pupils in S5 taking six rather than the customary five Highers. But speaking to the journalist about activities that take place outside the classroom took quite a long time, because we are a complex institution and the amazing breadth of co-curricular opportunities that we offer, and the quality displayed in all of them, cannot be explained in a few sentences. The 'exam factory' myth is easily dispelled by even a cursory look at our website, but the Sunday Times article did a good job here too.

In the same week as the Sunday Times award came another welcome news item - the OSCR judgement confirming our Charitable Status. This is a story that gives the lie to the myth that we are a school for 'rich kids'. Anyone can come here if they are clever enough and are prepared to work hard - that has been part of the Hutchie ethos for centuries. That it took OSCR so long to recognise this fundamental aspect of what makes us so special has been deeply dispiriting, but at least now it has been recognised, and we can move on. I believe that the school itself is the best judge of what we can or should do for 'wider public benefit' and it has been interesting to see the Charity Tribunal in England and Wales strip their Charity Commission (of which OSCR is the equivalent body in Scotland) of the powers to dictate to or judge independent schools in this way. I hope the same eventually becomes true in Scotland.

This year's S6, on the back of their superb Highers results (see page 3) are busy applying to universities through the UCAS process. They are the first year group to be faced with £9000 per year tuition fees if they choose a university in England, and the early signs are that those numbers are vastly down from the usual 20-25%. While wanting to avoid a large debt is perfectly understandable, it is a great shame that at a time when all our young people want to think of themselves as global citizens (see Jim McDougall's excellent summary of this part of Hutchie life later in this issue) circumstances are conspiring to make them stay closer to home. The differences between Scotland and what is worryingly becoming a useful acronym 'RUK' (rest of the UK) are thus further emphasised here, as well.

Just 4p day can feed a child living in poverty



There was an excited buzz across the whole school on Monday the 19th September as the new school charity was announced as Mary's Meals.

From humble beginnings in a garage in Argyll, the charity is now an international movement providing school feeding projects in communities where poverty and hunger prevent children from gaining an education. They provide one basic meal (often the only one) in the form of a cup of porridge or maize once a day in a school or nursery setting, giving children time to learn and develop future skills, instead of having to go to work to feed themselves.

Tony Begly, Education Co-ordinator for Mary's Meals commented on Hutchesons' outstanding previous record in fundraising saying:

"Access to nutrition and a basic education can have a lifechanging effect on a child and its community - we are looking forward to working together with all at Hutchesons' to help more children over the coming year."

Worldwide it costs just £9.40 to feed a child for a year (and just 4 pence a day) so every penny raised at the school will make a huge difference. We hope you will support us in future fundraising for this worthwhile cause. You can find out more about Mary's Meals at www.marysmeals.org.uk



Once again pupils in S4, S5 and S6 have performed very well in SQA and A level exams, with pass rates and A grades amongst the best in the country.

S5 pupils achieved an average of 4.6 Higher passes each, with 129 pupils achieving at least five Higher passes. 48 pupils (26% of the total year group) achieved at least five Grade A passes and 16 pupils passed six Highers at Grade A, with three of them – **Katie Ireland, Mairi Macrae** and **Hannah Todd** – gaining six band 1s.

Several departments at Hutchesons' significantly outstripped national standards in 'A' grades and pass rates for Higher. In Art, Computing, English and Geography more than 70% of candidates achieved A grades.

Two Hutchesons' pupils became the highest achieving candidates in the Higher Modern Studies exam this year. **Saqib Ali** and **Sarah Burns** gained 100% in the exam, which is taken by around 8000 pupils nationally.

Seventeen pupils in S6 achieved three A grades in Advanced Higher and/or A level, four of these achieving four As. **Timothy Heelis** achieved A band 1s at AH in Chemistry, Physics and Technology plus A*s in Maths and Further Maths A Level.

Four pupils won places to attend Cambridge and Oxford: **Charlotte Browning** (Law, Magdalene) and **Timothy Heelis** (Natural Sciences, St John's) at Cambridge and **Anna Gaudoin** (Law, Pembroke) and **Scott Melville** (Physics, Merton) at Oxford.

Hutchesons' Grammar School has an outstanding record in placing pupils in top universities throughout Scotland and the UK. In addition, some pupils spend a 'gap' year before proceeding to university. Around 40 pupils gained university places to study Law or Medicine following sixth year.

The Girls Dux was **Charlotte Browning** and the Boys Dux was **Timothy Heelis.**

Arkwright Award

Ben Parsonage (S5) has been awarded an Arkwright Scholarship, one of the most prestigious of its kind, which is presented in recognition of outstanding aptitude and excellence in design and technology.

The Scholarship uses a rigorous selection process and aims to inspire future leaders in engineering and related areas of design. The scheme provides support to pupils throughout their A Levels and Highers and encourages them to pursue engineering and design at university and as a career destination. Nationally, there were over 900 applicants and only 297 awards were granted.

Catriona Reid of last year's S5 received an award in 2010.

Staff member and keen photographer Mrs Tooth was on hand to capture the proceedings and a gallery documenting the day's events can be viewed on our website.




Charity award for Hutchesons'

Suhit Amin (P6) pictured, was the first to complete the Junior Duke this year closely followed by Carly Foxworthy (P6) they both achieved their Gold level.



This November Hutchesons' Grammar School was delighted to be named as Scottish Independent School of the Year in the Sunday Times Schools Guide 2011.

Alastair McCall, editor of the guide and Sunday Times' Parent Power, hailed Hutchesons' as the clear winner of the award, which recognises outstanding academic achievement alongside a variety of other factors and reflects our strong record in exam results, accessibility, charity and community work. He commended the school's history of philanthropy saying, "it is never far from the surface, both in terms of what the children strive to achieve and in the school's own efforts to bring the education it offers to the widest possible audience. That children achieve so highly, so consistently is remarkable - a tribute to the children themselves, the Rector and his dedicated staff



An extensive review of the school was also published online by the paper, in which writer Sue Leonard highlighted the positive culture at Hutchie by saying: "Creating the right environment in which children think it is cool to learn has played a major part in making

Hutchesons' Grammar School our Scottish Independent Secondary School of the Year."

She also reflected on the sense of community and mutual responsibility fostered across all age groups at Hutchesons': "Within school, sixthyear pupils take on duties from being buddies to new students to helping out at parents' evenings, marshalling pupils in the dinner queue and organising the school dance. More widely, all students are encouraged to consider others and to give back to the local area through its community service and fundraising projects for the school's annual charity, a reflection of its philanthropic legacy."

A recent edition of SecEd also spotlighted Hutchie's ability to encourage positive relationships on an international stage. In a feature on the schools successful Comenius programme, education writer Alison Thomas commented on Hutchesons' work with partner schools across the globe saying: "Three different countries, each with its own unique identity, all striving to create a vibrant sustainable environment for generations to come."

The Sunday Times review closed with a final word from the Rector, Dr Greig: "All these activities aim to develop the school's core values of honesty, resilience, independence, creativity, curiosity and compassion on which its ethos is based. They represent the qualities we would like a pupil to have when they leave."

Over 150 enthusiastic visitors of all ages toured the school and there were many former pupils amongst them, some of whom brought photographs and memories to share. Two former pupils, Anne Montgomerie, née Hepburn (C1954) and Elizabeth Lough, née McIlwrick (C1945) found that their visits took a nostalgic and unexpected turn when they spotted themselves on our display boards.

There were also many young families who wanted to learn more about the school and those who simply came to see the stunning architecture and original features of the Kingarth Street building.

Thanks must be given to our former pupil helpers, Morag Venner (C1959) and Sallie Harkness (C1956), the School Janitor David Finnie and the prefects who all gave valuable assistance on the day.

Think Local Act Global

Depute Rector Jim McDougall explains how the school aims to provide pupils with enriching and sometimes challenging experiences to benefit both themselves and the wider world.

A phrase which underpins much of the co-curricular life at Hutchesons might well be "Think Local Act Global". Our commitment to a range of projects at home and abroad helps our pupils to understand just what we mean by our core values, such as compassion, independence and curiosity. Our focus is on action and giving the pupils the chance to experience opportunities that challenge them, and help them to engage with important issues. These are valuable life skills, fostering an interest in other people and in the world about them

Nowhere is this more obvious than in the work carried out by our J8 group, who are becoming the focus for some innovative approaches to citizenship and human rights. With earlier success in promoting One Sugar as part of Social Enterprise Day, the J8 has helped raise awareness of inequalities in our world through competitions, assemblies and teaching materials for PSE. Recently, pupils Sarra Levinson and Josh Lewis were among the four short-listed pairs in competition to become the Young Global Education Ambassadors for 2011. Their video, "Send My Friend to School" was highly commended. We are proud that our fifth year J8 group has been recognised as runners up in the Red Cross Justice and Fairness competition, which asked young people to show off their knowledge and experience of humanitarian issues, by submitting presentations based around the themes of justice and fairness.

Our commitment to global issues, such as the UN's Millennium Goals, is also shared by the Model UN Society. MUN is growing in popularity and The Hutchie MUNSoc has been involved in several MUN Conference the length and breadth of the country. Pupils learn to debate, research and lobby, all the while learning about the cut and thrust of diplomacy. MUN does not shirk from tough, often challenging issues, such as the "rights of terrorists", "internet crime" and the role of pharmaceutical companies in developing

countries. At the last Conference in Cheadle Hulme, two of our pupils, **Haris Haseeb**, representing the Youth committee and **Kate Cameron**, representing the Human Rights committee received special Commendations.

Our world view continues to be informed by our programme of exchange visits. For the fourth year we have hosted two senior pupils from Goulburn Valley Grammar School, our partner school in Shepparton, Australia. The chance to trade experiences and learn new ideas is central to the whole concept of international education. The annual visit to Shepparton by Hutchie pupils helps promote independence, being a five week long trip, staying with host families, and exploring the tremendous variety of that large country. We have opened discussions on a similar partnership with one of Denver's leading independent schools, Colorado Academy. The hope is to develop a network of schools in various countries, each able to act as a hub for exchange visits and reciprocal study tours, both for staff and pupils.

India continues to be a core part of our programme for global citizenship. Over the last few years, pupils and teachers have visited our partner school in Nitte. All have come back eager to share their experiences, and wanting to do more. Visits to this small town in Southern India have been the springboard for a range of activities, most recently the Hutchie-Nitte challenge. Under the leadership of geography teachers Mr Calvin Clarke and Ms Akiko Tomitaka, the Challenge is a joint effort between pupils at Hutchesons' and our partner school, the Dr NSAM English Medium High School to raise awareness about the importance of education in both communities, and globally. Pupils in Nitte are volunteering to spread the word in their area about the importance of education. They are also researching the reasons why some children there do not go to school. The two pupils who do most in these tasks earn the chance to visit Hutchesons'. All this activity



is supported by a series of blog and video postings, designed to keep pupils up to date with developments.

Closer to home, the Comenius Partnership with schools in Germany and Poland concluded in June with a civic reception at Glasgow City Chamber, and the production of a booklet celebrating our focus on urban renovation and design. I was delighted to speak at the reception, saying: "Hutchesons' has a proud tradition of being part of the city of Glasgow and is delighted to play a part in developing the city's links with other countries, including a long-standing relationship with the city of Nurnberg. We are delighted to bring our Polish friends on board. It is also heartening to see representatives from local community groups who have done so much to encourage this project". Susan Breckenridge, Head of Art, added that: "The Partnership has given pupils the opportunity to work outwith the formal curriculum and experience historical, geographical, artistic and cultural differences, along with the challenges of working in an environment which relies on cooperation, motivation and friendship." These ties look set to continue, with further visits between the three schools already in preparation. Perhaps the last word on the true worth of the Partnership belongs to Massimo Sannino (C2011) who, commenting on the exchange visit to Nurnberg, said: "I really liked the fact that by being with the others nearly all day, changed us from being strangers to good friends."

A major theme of Comenius was sustainability in urban design. As part of our aim to get a Green Flag, we have been scrutinising our environmental credentials at Hutchesons'. Coordinated by Biology teacher Dr Dee McCarthy, levels of paper and cardboard recycling have continued to improve, while the RagBag scheme to collect textiles has proved very popular. With the stadium now completed, work on developing the conservation area has resumed, aided by an enthusiastic group of First Year pupils. We still want to bear down on items like plastics and develop a culture of re-use and recycling. By the end of Christmas we want every single member of staff and pupil to have pledged one specific thing to help improve the environment at Hutchesons. Our ambition is to have a wall of pledges that will encourage us to make Hutchie, in the words of our Eco-Code, "a dearer, green place".

Compassion is one of our core values, and lately we have been working hard to raise money for Mary's Meals. This Scottish based charity aims to provide one basic meal in the form of a cup of porridge or maize once a day in a school or nursery setting, giving children time to learn and develop future skills, instead of having to go to work to feed themselves. But compassion needs to go hand in hand with understanding, and, parallel with our fund raising activities, our pupils are encouraged to explore issues to do with world poverty, hunger and maternal health in form time and at pastoral assembly. We have also maintained connections with last year's charity, "Action for Children", by helping to support events and offering practical assistance at Stoneside Family Centre near Auldhouse.



4 pence can make a difference

This year's charity Mary's Meals has the simple but life changing goal of feeding a child a meal a day and this has been taken to heart by the whole school.

Primary 3 were so touched by the presentation from Tony Begly, Education Co-ordinator for Mary's Meals, that they started collecting small change the next day.

Their first total was £1.28 - this sounds like a small amount but with Mary's Meals it could feed a staggering 32 children. P3 were inspired to continue fundraising and one boy summed up the mood in the class by saying: "It makes me feel so happy to know that we are filling children's empty hungry tummies".

Across the school pupils, parents and staff have been filling bags for the Mary's Meals Backpack Project, to help provide children who have suffered due to war, poverty, famine, or natural disasters, with the basics like pencils and copy books and suitable clothes for school.

More fundraising projects are underway, a new school charity scarf (see page 3) has been launched, pupils did a fantastic job with the annual charity cross country run and teachers followed this with a sponsored mile.

Thank you for all the support so far, the school's mealometer has now reached an amazing 38 thousand meals and we hope to raise that total even higher in 2012.

Hutchie Herald goes green

From December 2011 future editions of the Hutchie Herald will be produced under our new Carbon Neutral (CN) scheme. The magazine will be printed on quality recycled paper using vegetable based inks, sustainable materials and will carry the CN logo as part of a scheme to help offset the school's Carbon footprint.

Carbon offsets are credits for reductions in greenhouse gas emissions made at another location, such as wind farms which create renewable energy and reduce the need for fossil-fuel powered energy. A CN accredited print company, PR Print, will automatically invest the school's CARRON carbon neutral EUTRAL" savings in a clean energy scheme based in India.



We last caught up with Drew Millar, known at Hutchie as **Andrew Adam** (C2005), in 2009 when he was touring the UK in Andrew Lloyd Webber's "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat".



With the new drama facilities opening early next year, we contacted Drew to find out exactly what his life as a Hutchesons' drama student was like and how his experiences at school have influenced his future career.

What are your best memories from drama at Hutchie?

I will never forget the euphoria and satisfaction I felt after playing both the roles of Tony in "West Side Story" and Marius in "Les Miserables" in the senior school productions. I would always anxiously await the ringing of the bell at 3.30 as I knew it would signal the start of rehearsals. I quickly discovered music and singing was my way to escape the stresses of everyday life and, for a few hours, I'd lose myself to a whole new world.

Do you feel your time at Hutchie has made an impact on your career as a performer?

I believe whole-heartedly that if I'd not gone to Hutchie and worked with the people I did I wouldn't be the performer I am today. The biggest inspiration and influence I have

is the incredible head of drama, and great friend, Mrs Valerie Alderson. "Mrs A" watched an audition tape of me singing a pop song by Anastacia in my fourth year and immediately spotted potential.



As a skilled director she encouraged and challenged me to grow in confidence which was reflected significantly in my performances throughout my senior years at school.


It is paramount for an artist to feel safe in the hands of a director; I always knew I was safe working with Mrs Alderson and trust her judgement implicitly. She has an amazing gift of bringing out the best in a performer and I know there are countless others who talk of the influence Mrs A had on their lives at Hutchie.

Were you excited to hear about the opening of the drama studios at Beaton Road?

I was delighted when Mrs Alderson told me about the plans for the theatre at Hutchie. Finally her determination, diligence and professionalism are reflected in the new space the drama department can now call home. I know how much this means to Mrs A and her team, not to mention the impact it will have on generations of students to come.

I donated to the fund to support the project and strongly encourage other former pupils to give anything they can to such a worthwhile cause; I know I'd be grateful if I was a current student.



Frozen Planet

Former pupil **Dr Kenny Taylor** (C1972) a lifelong naturalist and keen musician, esteemed author, musician, broadcaster and presenter shares a personal reminiscence from his early days at the school:



As hard winters go, the one when the Taylor family made its first connection to Hutchesons' was memorable. Quite simply, it was Britain's coldest of the last century. Sub-zero temperatures persisted for months, while repeated heavy snows blocked roads and railway lines alike.

One memory from that frozen season is of an entrance exam held in a building that seemed to be situated in the Glaswegian arctic. The huge expanse of playing fields to one side, off-white under a leaden sky, added to the strangeness.

Things at Beaton Road were never again that chilling for me. And as I look back over the lion's (or ice bear's) share of half a century since then, I'm glad of prolonged links to the school, not least through my parents' involvement.

When I was in P6 or 7, my mother – Doris Taylor – began teaching in what was then 'The Boys' School', after I'd tipped her off about a vacancy. A few years later, she moved to the senior school and taught history until her retirement in the autumn of 1982. From former pupils and colleagues, including her close friend

Graham MacAllister, I know what an inspiration and help she was to many students.

A year or so before Doris retired, my father, George, taught part-time at the school. With hindsight, his involvement has huge significance. For in essence, George laid early foundations for the teaching of business studies.

Until then, despite the popularity of business careers with many Hutchie alumni, there was no formal teaching of subjects such as accounting and economics. George, a journalist and teacher who had recently retired as head of business studies at John Neilson's in Paisley, suggested to the rector, Peter Whyte, that he'd be happy to give relevant tuition, a few days a week, to interested pupils. And so he did, training them for qualifications using reference materials that included a small accountancy dictionary he had written, typed and duplicated.

I think both George (who died in 1996) and Doris (who died in 2007) would be amazed by the resources at Beaton Road today. My parents (pictured below) were a great team, both in their long marriage and as teachers who made a distinctive contribution to the school in the late 20th century.



And that thought still warms me, decades after my family's first encounter with Ice Station Hutchie.

The George & Thomas Hutcheson Awards

The George and Thomas Hutcheson Awards were established in 1997 by the School and FP Council in recognition of Hutchesonians regarded by their peers as inspirational figures. The 2011 winners have been announced as esteemed crime author Sandra McGruther, née Lang aka Alex Gray (C1968) and wildlife producer, writer and journalist Dr Kenneth Taylor (C1972). They received their awards at a special ceremony at the school on Friday 2 December.



Milicent Bell, née Leslie

Class of 1934, 1916 - 2011

Milicent Hélène Sturrock Bell, medical practitioner and artist, born Glasgow 17th October 1916, died Colchester, Essex, 18th June 2011.



Milicent Bell, who died aged 94, was a pioneering cytologist who established a unit at the Victoria Infirmary in Glasgow in 1965 - a very early example of its kind - where she remained senior doctor until her retirement in 1981.

Milicent Hélène Sturrock Leslie was born in Glasgow in 1916 and educated at Hutchesons' Girls' Grammar School and The University of Glasgow, from which in 1939 she graduated in medicine and then worked briefly as a research assistant in Bacteriology at the Western Infirmary. In 1942 she married William Bell, then a Church of Scotland Minister. In Lanarkshire, where his first parish was, she worked in maternity and child welfare before the family moved, in 1948, to Tyneside where William was now working for the British Council. Whilst bringing up her family she found the time to work professionally part time, undertaking child welfare clinics (a mainstay of the early NHS, in which she was always a great believer) and later assisting in general practice. She declined the offer of her own general practice in Gateshead when her husband's work took him to Finland for a number of years, and where she latterly joined him. There, she received the approval of the medical authorities to practice and did so for a number of years, principally within the British Embassy.

In 1965, the family moved back to Glasgow, where William became The University's senior administrator, and with it came the opportunity for her to study and then practice cytology. After a short period of study, she was appointed in November 1965 GP Cytologist at the Victoria Infirmary. There she established a laboratory to screen cervical smears, searching for early signs of the cancer that was becoming more to be recognised as a serious threat to women's health: for a number of years, she would spend several long sessions every week peering down a microscope for that purpose. By the early 1970s, she and her colleague Dr Anne Nisbet-Smith, had started to do aspiration cytology (a technique of extracting cells for examination using a fine hollow needle). In the mid-sixties, both practices were ground-breaking: very few such units had been established, and it would take years for them to become widespread. And in those early years the view within the profession in hospitals, particularly the pathologists, was

mixed: wary, suspicious, but not altogether hostile. It was also very early for a woman to be in such an influential hospital post and Milicent Bell was one of the first. Both factors brought their tensions.

Besides her long association with medicine (her subscription to the British Medical Journal was still in place when she died) she was an accomplished artist. Soon after she and her husband retired, in 1971, the couple moved to Kirkcudbright in Galloway, which for many years was an artists' town. There, she painted in watercolour and oils, and created some excellent sculptured busts and figurines, exhibiting both in her adopted town and, in 1987, a bronze head at the Royal Glasgow Institute of the Fine Arts.

Her final years were spent in Wivenhoe, Essex, near two of her three sons, all of whom survive her. Her husband pre-deceased her.

Crudens in Edinburgh as a Director and in 1970 he moved south to establish their office in London, in 1975 he joined the HAT Group based in the South West of England and the family moved to Bristol. After a long period of employment he took the decision to go at it alone and started a PVC welding and manufacturing company in Bristol in 1980. Shortly after this he bought a marquee hire company which he ran with his son Alastair.

He married Ann in 1963 in Kidderminster and they had three children, son Alastair and daughters, Emma and Lucy. He was immensely proud of his three children as they all followed in his foot steps by running their own companies. He was also the very proud grand father of seven grand children, Amelia, Phoebe, Sophie, Rosie, Ben, Jessica and Molly. He was a very loving and caring father and always had time to help, support and advise others. He will be greatly missed by all his family and friends.

Although living in England he was a very proud Scotsman and vigorously supported Scotland at every sporting occasion, much to the annoyance of his English friends and son in laws. He had very vivid and fond memories of his time at Hutchesons', and many a diner at home with his peers would end with a rendition of the school song. He greatly enjoyed the former pupil diners in London and sharing his memories with friends old and new.

Muriel Harris, née Links

Muriel Harris, née Links immigrated with her husband Sidney Harris to Israel in 1949. She studied for her English teacher's degree at the Tel-Aviv University and was an English teacher at the prestigious Katznelson Secondary School in Kfar-Sava for 25 years, where she was much loved by her pupils. Widowed prior to retirement, Muriel is survived by her partner of 12 years, Shmuel Amid.

Joyce Blythe Henderson

Hutchesons' PE staff member 1954 - 1962 and Principal Teacher of Girls' PE 1972 -1994 with almost 30 years of service at the school.

Joyce died in an Ayr nursing home after many years of distressing ill health. Prior to this, she was a lively, busy person who packed her days with a variety of activities, mostly with an emphasis on sport.

'Hutchie' played a huge part in her life as a pupil, a very supportive F.P. and as a loyal member of the Physical Education Department. She joined the staff in 1954 as an assistant to the late Eleanor Howie, had a spell at Park School as Head of P.E. and then returned as Eleanor Howie's successor in charge of P.E. in the girls school at Kingarth Street. After the amalgamation of both schools in 1975, Joyce became Head of girl's Physical Education in both Kingarth Street and Beaton Road.

She will be fondly remembered by many as an inspirational coach and teacher who took her teams to the highest standard of school games.



Margaret S. McConnell, née Reid Hutchesons' English staff member from 1965 – 1980, Class of 1929, 1913 - 2011



Margaret graduated from Glasgow
University with Honours in English in 1934
and taught in many Glasgow Schools before
returning to teach at Hutchie Girls' in 1965.
She stayed on long past the normal age of
retirement, the only teacher in Glasgow, if
not Scotland at the time, to teach creative
writing, she was a meticulous editor of the
school magazine. Margaret was a much
respected and popular member of staff
both with colleagues and pupils, with her
great enthusiasm for her subject and her
understated sense of humour.

She had always written in her spare time and published 15 romantic novels and countless short stories and serials for women's magazines. She was still appearing regularly in The People's Friend well into her eighties. Keen to promote new writing in Scotland, she was instrumental in setting up The Scottish Association of Writers, becoming its first President and eventually was appointed its Honorary President. Many of her former pupils were members and she took great pride and pleasure in the successes of those who went on to make their mark as novelists, poets and playwrights. This indefatigable woman also trained as a classical singer with the legendary Winifred Busfield at the RSAMD; took her LRAM when she was 40 and taught singing in the evenings for many years.

Up until the beginning of this year Margaret was sharp as a tack and living independently in her own home, but a series of cumulative illnesses dogged her and she died on October 1 not long after her 98th birthday.

Margaret's elder daughter, the late Elizabeth Yearling was Dux of the Girls' School in 1963, and she is survived by her younger daughter, Maev Alexander C1965 and her grandchildren Rebecca, Simon and Alix.
