

The annual Prize Giving, which was held on the 23rd of June, was a particularly poignant occasion this year as it marked the last formal event for the outgoing Rector Dr Ken Greig.

The Chairman of the Trust, Professor Brian Williams, thanked distinguished academic Dr Greig for his valuable service to the school and offered a warm welcome to new Rector Mr Colin Gambles. Professor Williams also thanked all Hutchesons' staff, pupils and families for their continued support and hard work over the School year.

Pupil Lisa Cummings (S6) then gave a polished and heartfelt performance of Henry Purcell's "Music for a While", before Dr Greig took to the podium for the final time as Rector.

Dr Greig gave his personal thanks to staff and to pupils, in particular the Bursar, Mr Keter, his Senior Management Team and the current Head Boy and Girl - Jack Leslie and Jenny Anderson. He spoke warmly of his wonderful memories at Hutchie, the numerous friendships and excellent performances, concerts and art shows which he would remember fondly.

Dux

Dr Greig congratulated the Dux pupils and prize winners for "symbolising the best of Hutchie and the excellence of all!". He then went on to reflect on his own final day at School, encouraging pupils "not to fear transitions but to welcome them".

It was then time to welcome distinguished guest speaker, Baroness Meta Ramsay, a real life "M" whose career could have been written by Iain Fleming. She represents, as Dr Greig remarked, a truly remarkable role model for young women.

Baroness Ramsay told the audience how her own Hutchesons' experience had empowered her to excel in the Diplomatic Service which was in her time "very much a man's world". She said: "Our teachers were a marvellous generation of women who literally dedicated their lives to educating us in the fullest sense of that word – teaching us to believe there was nothing a Hutchie girl could not do and nowhere she could not go."

The numerous prizes were then distributed to great applause, followed by a sincere vote of thanks from the Head Girl, Jenny Anderson and a loud and enthusiastic "Three Cheers for the School" from the Head Boy, Jack Leslie.

Achievements & Awards



Biology Olympiad Success

Biology pupils have once again enjoyed tremendous success in this year's British Biology Olympiad.

Nine pupils have been awarded medals or have been commended. Gold Medallist, Christopher Docherty S6 was in the top 2.1% of students from around the UK who entered this year. His achievement recognises his tremendous biological knowledge.

Nikhil Agarwal S6 was awarded a Silver Medal and Jenny Anderson S6 received a Bronze Medal. S6 pupils Jessica Boyle, Vishal Mishra and Zeus Murphy were all Highly Commended and Sahil Kakar, Wajeeh Raza and Adil Shahid were Commended.

Over 7,200 students took part and to have nine of our pupils in the award categories is excellent.

Focus on Talent

The annual photography competition was held last term and the entries were impressive.



Pupils in S1-3 submitted photos in two categories – "My Environment" and "Close Up" and they really rose to the challenge. There were some fantastic images of flowers, insects, birds, a monkey, a teddy bear, fireworks, sunsets, waterfalls and the Northern Lights on display.

A close-up of a duck in a pond by S2's Natasha Dick won "Outstanding Image". Dr Greig was particularly impressed with the detail of the feathers.

Maths Whiz Ashmi

Ashmi Deb achieved a bronze medal in the Junior Mathematical Olympiad – a phenomenal achievement for an S1 pupil.

Now in S2, Ashmi entered the national maths challenge last term. The Rector Mr Gambles said: "This is a significant achievement for someone in her age group. Well done Ashmi."

Hoops Star Jessica

S3 basketball star Jessica Buchanan's trip to Spain was a real slam dunk – her team won all the matches. Jessica featured in an elite Scotland squad

which took on its Spanish counterparts in June. Team Alba



performed well in the final so Jessica is hoping to be called up again next year.



Trio Represent Scotland

Three pupils were selected to play for the Scotland hockey team at the UK Games in Loughborough.

David Nairn and Alasdair Richmond, both S5, joined S6's Mairi Fletcher at the tournament which saw teams from Scotland, England, Wales and Ireland battle it out on the hockey pitch at the beginning of September.

The P.E. Department's Mr Dunlop said: "Many of the competitors at Rio started here only a few years ago so let's hope for further success from them and the rest of the team."

During the summer David and his older brother James, who left Hutchie in June, represented Scotland Under 18s in the European Championship Trophy. Mairi also competed in the girls' competition.

Physics Olympiad

S4 and S5 pupils achieved success in the nationwide Physics competition –



winning a number

of gold, silver and bronze awards.

S5 pupils Christopher Docherty achieved a Gold Award in the British Physics Olympiad AS Challenge 2016. Daniel Boulton-Jones and Animesh Mishra received Bronze 1 Awards while Gareth Williams won a Bronze 2 Award.

Poppy Azmi achieved a Gold Award in the British Physics Olympiad Physics Challenge 2016. Hamzah Hanif, Wan-Hew Tran and Katie Zhang achieved Silver awards and Josh Bicknell, Ben Bicknell, Carter Cohen, Finlay Drummond, Freddie Morton, Amy Stewart and Ahsan Rushd won Bronze 2 Awards. A further 28 pupils received commendations.





Cambridge Chemistry Win

S6 pupil Chris Docherty's phenomenal performance in the Cambridge Chemistry Challenge secured him a place at the institution's coveted Chemistry Camp. Chris received the Roentgenium Award in the science challenge which means he was one of the top 55 scoring students.

His reward was a week long, intensive chemistry course at St Catherine's College, Cambridge. Here Chris tells us about the 'invaluable' experience. "The whole experience was really amazing and I highly recommend all of

the 5th year chemistry students to sit the competition this year as this camp is an invaluable asset to have.

Complex

"I attended a number of lectures and practical lab sessions which were very different from school. One experiment involved titrating a copper complex in order to work out the percentage mass of the different compounds in the complex. "This was a stark change from school experiments as we had to determine the formula for this complex from our results. "Another practical session saw us determine the concentration of soap at which micelles form. This was an extremely independent experiment as we were not given the method to calculate this and had to work it out ourselves! "I also attended a formal dinner where I was given first year university textbooks, written and signed by one of the organisers of the competition Dr Peter Wothers.

"On my last night I visited Corpus Christi college to get a lecture on the origins of chemistry – passing by the bar where Watson and Crick announced their discovery of DNA on the way!"



Gold for P7 Relay Girls

A massive well done to the P7 relay team for winning gold at the Scottish Schools Primary Relay championships at Grangemouth.

Rebecca Anderson, Zoe Flower, Erin Frew, Olivia Schenini and Anna Young missed the School sports day to attend the interschool event. The girls competed in a series of trials before winning the final 4x100m event.



Secondary School

Subject Highlights

The S5 year group achieved excellent results in a number of subjects with 69% of them achieving a grade A at Higher. Indeed, all the pupils sitting Economics, German and Latin achieved a grade A in the SQA exams.

Pupils sitting Higher and Advanced Higher English also achieved excellent results and there was not a single failure among the S4, S5 and S6 pupils who sat the external SQA examinations in May. Head of English My Symington said: "I was delighted to see such a large Advanced Higher class achieve very strong results - 80% achieved A. It was great to see our high flyers do so well but also encouraging to see so many pupils in less academic sets perform strongly and achieve many As." History pupils performed well at both Higher and Advanced Higher level. Their efforts paid off and 36 of the 41 who sat the Higher got an A. At Advanced Higher 14 of the 15 pupils who sat the exam achieved an A.



Mental Health is Key

S2 pupils attended a Mental Health Workshop run by a team of specialist psychiatrists to raise awareness of mental health.

The event saw the pupils split into small groups to discuss their thoughts on a number of different issues relating to mental well-being.

The 'No health without mental health' workshop was run by Child and Adolescent Psychiatrist Dr Saman Khan and her team. They introduced the children to the Safe Spot app which is an innovative approach to promoting positive mental health and resilience. Thanks to Dr Khan and her colleagues for a very informative session.



Pupils performed exceptionally well in this year's SQA exams and set a couple of school records.

Their commitment to their studies and the support from parents and teachers has achieved a record set of results and almost all of them secured the results necessary for their first choice university.

An impressive 18 pupils got six A grades at Higher while 59 achieved five or more As. More than half the pupils – 81 in all – were awarded four As or more.

Senior Depute Rector Mr Martin said: "I am delighted that our senior pupils have, once again, excelled in the SQA Examinations. The individual and collective results are superb and are just reward for the effort and commitment shown by the pupils this year. "Congratulations and thanks must also go to their teachers for their dedication, attention and care. Well done, too, to the parents whose support is invaluable. Working together has been key to securing the success the pupils now enjoy.

"Advanced Higher results are very pleasing with a jump in A grade passes which will see virtually all pupils accepted to their first choice course and university. For their first experience of external examinations, at National 5, the S4 pupils shone. Over three quarters of all examinations sat were awarded grade A. Well done.

"In the all-important Higher examinations, for \$5, the 151 pupils achieved an impressive 521 'A' grades among them. In fact, 69% of all the Higher examinations sat by \$5 were awarded grade A – one better than last year's record. The pass rate of 96.5% is also a recent record.

"These are outstanding achievements by any measure and I am very proud of all the pupils and Team Hutchie. The future is bright."




Challenge Week

S3 pupils enjoyed a very successful community challenge week which saw them visit a number of charity-run groups to offer support in a variety of ways.

Whether it was to contribute to the general running of each centre or to interact with people who use the centres, the pupils accepted the challenge and excelled in their roles. They learnt why the centres were set up and the difference these charities make to many lives.

Groups visited the Nan Mackay Hall in Pollokshields where the pupils helped with the variety of social and educational classes which are run for the local community, the Action for Children centre in Eastwood where the pupils created artwork, painted decking and fencing, cleared weeds and generally tidied up the garden area and St Rollox church where pupils helped with the running of the shop and café for refugees who use the centre on a daily basis.

Futures Conference

S5 pupils returned from exam leave to a packed programme of events designed to give them a flavour of S6 experiences.

The pupils learnt that S6 comes with increasing responsibilities and they quickly realised that they would need to start making plans for their future.

Competition for university places is fierce and the Futures Conference gave pupils an essential head start in preparing their applications. A workshop introduced them to the UCAS process and representatives from Glasgow and Strathclyde universities also visited the School to talk to the pupils. They also heard from former pupils who returned to Beaton Road to share their experiences of the first year at university.

The pupils also took part in a fun RAF team-building session which gave them the opportunity to enhance their communication and teamwork skills.

Recipe for Success

S1 pupils created a healthy eating recipe book to help raise funds for the School charity. As part of the Personal and Social Education Programme, pupils learnt about healthy eating in order to support an overall healthy lifestyle. Each form brought ingredients into school and spent lunchtimes preparing their creations.



The recipe book contains contributions from all form classes and includes photographs of our enthusiastic chefs as well as their impressive finished products.



A Model UN Collaboration

The School welcomed 20 third year pupils from Williamwood High School to take part in a Model UN workshop.

The pupils worked together as delegates from six countries (each a mix of Hutchie and Williamwood pupils) to become more familiar with the key phases of a typical Model UN - writing a resolution, lobbying other delegations and speaking in public.

They also dealt with an imaginary global crisis – a North Korean rocket misfiring on to an oil tanker.

Depute Rector of Ethos Jim McDougall said: "Model UN is about learning how to work together to address global issues - both our schools are committed to global citizenship."



The Design Engineering Club members were first in line to test out the Technology Department's new vinyl cutter. This new equipment will help pupils studying N5 and Higher Graphic Communication to realise elements of their design work.

So far it has been put to good use to create new and elaborate signage which has been popping up around the school. The pupils have excelled with the introduction of new software and processes which can be quite tricky to perfect. Look out for what they come up with next!



Charity total tops £25k

The school has raised an impressive £25,455 for this year's charity NetsforLife[®].

George and Thomas Hutcheson Award

Former pupil Leon Smith returned to Beaton Road to receive a George and Thomas Hutcheson Award for his achievements in tennis.

The Davis Cup team coach, who was recently awarded an OBE, was delighted to receive the School honour and said: "It's a huge honour and privilege to accept this award."

Leon (C1993) brought a surprise for the pupils, staff and friends of the School who had attended the special presentation ceremony in the Helen and Walter Ross Assembly Hall on October 4th – The Davis Cup Trophy.

Leon was appointed the Captain of the Great Britain Davis Cup team in April 2010 – taking over from John Lloyd. In 2015 Leon and his team, which included Andy and Jamie Murray, won the Davis Cup for the first time in 79 years. A phenomenal achievement for Leon, the players and Great Britain.

The dad-of-three told the audience it was good to be back in his old school and he was looking forward to going on a short tour of Beaton Road after the ceremony. He said: "This is a great school and it taught me how to project myself well and be a team player. It is surreal being back here. I have a very vivid memory of sitting my Standard Grade History exam in this very hall. I have been getting my bearings. The first place I want to go and see is my old Deputy Rector Sandy Strang's office – I spent a lot of time there!"



He was also delighted to meet up with a number of his former teachers including Director of Sport Mr Lang, P.E. teacher in charge of tennis Mrs Lang and retired P.E. teacher Mrs Park.

He said: "I can't believe it's been 23 years since I left here and walked out the school gates for the last time. What's more amazing than that is Mr Lang is still here."

During the ceremony Head Boy Callum Young and Head Girl Keziah Abbotts read out the Award Citation which focused on Leon's tennis career. He began coaching professionally in local tennis clubs around Glasgow from the age of 18 and in 1998 he concentrated on elite players and became national performance officer for Tennis Scotland.

Leon helped set up a tennis academy in Edinburgh two years later and in 2004 re-joined Tennis Scotland as LTA Academy coach and national training coach for Scotland. A year later Leon was appointed the LTA's national under-16





men's coach and in 2008 he became the U-18 coach. In 2010 he was appointed the Head of Men's Tennis.

Leon took on the role of Davis Cup Team Coach with the same confidence which saw him rise through the ranks of the LTA. He admitted to the audience that he was an unusual choice for the top job having never played professionally himself. However, he was determined to take his team to the top and did his homework on all the opposition players and carried out a huge amount of analysis. The approach paid off. He said he travelled 30 to 35 weeks of the year watching the world's best players and described it as "a pretty cool job."

He answered a number of questions from the school's tennis team players and told them clay was his favourite tennis surface, Andy Murray was his favourite player because "he puts everything in and is determined to win" and that the support at Glasgow's Emirates stadium was the best. He also joked that his

brothers Toby and Gary, who are also tennis coaches, had never beaten him in a match.

Leon revealed his big break came when Judy Murray contacted him to ask if he would coach her 11-year-old son Andy. He coached him from the age of 11 - 15 during which time he won the Junior Orange Bowl, the world championships for U-12s, and five other ITF Futures events.

After the official ceremony concluded Leon spent time coaching the School's current tennis team players and gave them top tips to improve their game. S3's Robbie Prentice said: *"It was great to meet Leon; he is such an inspiration."*

The G&T awards are presented by the Former Pupil Council in recognition of Hutchesonians who are regarded by their peers as inspirational figures, whether by virtue of their academic or professional achievements; triumph over adversity; public spiritedness or the like. Leon was a very worthy winner.

Surprise Visit

Davis Cup team coach Leon Smith also surprised Kingarth Street pupils and staff at a morning assembly in May.

Pupils had been told there was going to be a special assembly but they had no idea who the important guest was until Leon walked into the hall. The children and the staff could barely contain their excitement as the curtains opened to display the huge Davis Cup trophy.

Leon (C1993) answered a volley of questions from our primary pupils who took the fantastic opportunity to quiz him on a number of topics.

He expertly and diplomatically answered a range of questions including:-

- How did you become so great?
- What do you do when someone doesn't follow your instructions?
- Who has been the most difficult player to coach?
- Have you ever pretended your tennis racquet was a guitar?

Leon confessed to using his tennis racquet as an air guitar and told the children: "I'm in no way embarrassed to answer yes to that. Doesn't everyone? My children do it all the time and I don't know anyone who hasn't used it as a guitar."

Leon then spent an hour coaching some of the primary pupils in the assembly hall.

Scotland Trio

Three pupils were selected to play for the Scotland hockey teams at the UK School Games in Loughborough in September.

The team comprising of Captain Rachel Wood (S6) and Helen Neary (S5) in the senior category, Catriona Rennick (S4) and Zaynab Zahra (S3) in the intermediate category, Iona Purdie and Catriona Irvine (both S1) in the junior category and Brodi Cuthill and Emma Murray (both P6), our primary players, all served, rallied and smashed their way to a famous school victory. They won the Bank of Scotland Centenary Cup by winning more games than any other school. Brodi and Emma also won the primary category and received an award for their efforts. Congratulations on a brilliant team effort.



S2's Anna MacKenzie won the Glasgow Schools Golf Championship in May and later joined her brother Tom in the Scottish Schools competition. Anna was victorious over the Milngavie Golf Club course where her technique saw her hit some fine shots to win the competition. Anna, along with her brother Tom S4 and S5's Lewis Irvine performed well in June's Scottish Schools. Lewis was part of the Glasgow team which came 2nd overall.



Senior Sports Day

Pupils took part in a number of track and field events, including long jump, shot putt and relay races as well as some fun ones like the vertical jump and turbo javelin. S2's Zara Mason put in an impressive track performance winning the 100m race in 12.4s – a new record. There were a number of other awards and S4's Alessandro Schenini's fantastic athletic achievements throughout the year were recognised during the prize-giving.

Orla (S3) flew out to Belgium in May to take part in the U-15 European Squash Junior Championship where she won five of her seven matches. The U-15s finished 5th overall which was a fantastic achievement for the team. In April, Jemma (S1) joined Orla in the Five Nations championship in Lilleshall and both played some amazing matches.



International Cap

It's 2am and I can't breathe in the thin air at 17,000 feet as I wake up coughing. We're only 3 hours away from Everest Base Camp but I start to panic that I'll be the one who won't make it. Calm down and breathe, as I remind myself it's just the lack of oxygen at high altitude.

There's been a cold going round the group too and now it's my turn to run a temperature. Drink more water, take some paracetamol before it's time to head for Base Camp in the morning I decide. I wonder how the lads are faring too as a few of them have been toiling on the way up with a stomach bug and look like they can't go on. Will the group all be ready to go?

The Hutchie team of eight has worked hard to get to this day. The trip has been 18 months in the planning and we have all been training well to get fit. A couple of them even climbed the equivalent height of Everest Base Camp in Scotland to raise money for the victims of the Nepal Earthquake.

We have been trekking upwards for 9 days now which has been strenuous and especially tough for those feeling sick. However, we have been lucky to see stunning views of gorges, suspension bridges and the awesome snow-capped peaks of the Himalayas which has more than made up for it. The team have gelled together and evenings are filled with laughter and games.

'Bistari, bistari' our Sherpa guide calls to us which means 'slowly, slowly' in Nepali. We keep hearing tales of other groups in front and behind us who have gone up too fast only to suffer altitude sickness and have had to be rescued by helicopter. Our Far Frontiers guides are excellent though and will look after us.

They know exactly how much height we can gain each day as well as the acclimatisation required. The morning of our final ascent to 17,575 feet arrives and everyone is ready. 'Jaam, Jaam' our Sherpa guide calls in Nepali which we all know means 'Let's go!' We can't believe it but the sky is clear and the awe-inspiring ice walls of the world's



highest mountains rise II,000 feet vertically above us. A massive yak is standing beside the sign pointing to Everest Base Camp. Wow today is going to be special!

The cloud continues to clear and the Mount Everest summit comes into view. We've made it to Everest Base Camp! I'm so proud of the Hutchie team's fabulous achievement! The boys decide to have a go at playing the world's highest game of touch rugby which also ends up being one of the shortest as the thin air takes its toll!

The adventure continues as we descend to see wonderful sights such as colourful Buddhist monasteries, the Monkey Temple and the friendly yet

chaotic bustling streets of Kathmandu. I can honestly say that we've had the trip of a lifetime and will treasure the memories.

"Taking on some difficult terrain and weather in the Himalayas, the students all supported and looked out for each other. Every student attempting to reach Base Camp successfully made it, all in high spirits, and I would like to applaud them for doing so. Not everyone who takes on the challenge succeeds. Some of the athletes I was coaching were filming the brand launch for the Glasgow 2014 Games and when the main athlete didn't turn up for the shoot I was asked to stand in as a weight-lifter.

"I was then scouted by a model agency in Glasgow which led to me signing with them and then an agency in Milan and London doing campaigns such as Brooks Brothers, which was heavily featured around New York City.

"From this campaign, I was scouted by a film director which led to a lead role in a short film and I also starred as the lead in two other short films which won awards in LA and Calgary for Best Thriller."

His feature film breakthrough – King Arthur: Legend of the Sword - came after he starred alongside David Beckham in the Haig Club advert which was also directed by Guy Ritchie.

Craig has even been tipped to be the next James Bond by showbiz reporters and it is a role he would relish.

After leaving school Craig played rugby for the Scotland U20 team but during a World Cup in Italy he dislocated his shoulder

Polly (C1993) has been treading the boards as governess Miss Mathieson in NC Hunter's A Day by the Sea at the Beckett Theatre and her polished performance has caught the attention of the New York Times theatre critic Neil Genzlinger.

"Miss Mathieson isn't around much, but what Ms. McKie does with her one big scene, a confessional moment of yearning, is heart-stopping."

He's not alone in singing Polly's praises. Totaltheatre.com stated: *"Polly McKie's* warm portrayal of housekeeper, Miss Mathieson, is truly lamentable as a lonely middle-aged woman yearning for a family of her own before it is too late", while Theatre Mania wrote: "McKie is extremely moving, adding a great deal of heartbreaking authenticity to the proceedings." Polly's love of theatre began when she first took to the stage in Kingarth Street as a P1 pupil. But it was her performance in her final year at Beaton Road that set her on her path to theatre stardom.

She said: "I was always in every school production, starting with "Mary" in the Nativity when I was 5 and ending with the role that made me realise this was what I wanted to do as an adult, in my last year of school: "Meg Brockie" in Brigadoon."

After leaving school Polly, who has lived in New York for eight years, graduated with an M.A. in Theatre and Philosophy and continued her studies with a postgraduate certificate in drama education, deciding to take the sensible career path and work as a teacher.

However, the desire to perform herself never left and she has since performed in UK theatres, in Bermuda and the States. She has also had roles in TV and film and her distinctive Scottish voice ensured she became the voice of the digital book of Disney's Brave.

Today the staff room is less formal and the room is bright and airy. Staff can enjoy their tea, coffee and even the odd cake in comfort.



Book Club

Two former pupils have recently had their work published.

Ross Harper (C1953) launched his book 'Beyond Reasonable Doubt – a memoir' in September and he flew in from his home in Australia for the event at Waterstones book store in Glasgow.

Chapter Two recalls his school years and Ross shares his memories of a Hutchie education. After leaving school Ross became a major figure in Scottish Law, politics, journalism and business before moving Down Under. He was also a key player in many of Scotland's high profile legal cases from the 1960s-90s.

He was the President of the Law Society of Scotland and the International Bar Association and has been active in politics throughout his adult life, campaigning for the Conservative Party.

All proceeds from the book will be paid to the Ross Harper Foundation which has so far given over £90,000 to help pupils at Hutchesons' and students at the University of Glasgow and the University of Strathclyde.

Doug Clelland (C1964) has written a collection of short stories called 'God's Brains'. The 29 stories explore the growing certainty that much of what we take for granted is slipping. In some of the stories beliefs and habits are scrutinised and sometimes taken to task.

After leaving school Doug worked internationally as an architect and as a professor of architecture in Britain and Berlin.

Reflections

Former pupil Richard Sim has recently published his book "FREEDOM TO ARGUE...We the People versus They the Government" which tackles many of the issues underlying the Brexit vote. Richard has enjoyed a successful career in business and here he reflects on a 'life founded in Scottish values and the rigour of a Hutchesons' education.

"I left Hutchie in 1962 at age 17 determined to make my way in life. I have by any measure been very successful . A first class engineering degree at Glasgow was followed by a PhD at Cambridge with two rugby blues all by age 23. I emigrated to the US in 1970. I rose through US industry and



by age 43 I was CEO and Chairman of a NYSE public company. In the subsequent years I have lived in the UK, Ireland and Italy while all the time running global industrial companies. I have been privileged to see and experience all the cultures of the world. How on earth did all this come about?

Challenge

The foundation of it all is my experience at Hutchie. Hutchie back then was tough. I entered in the primary and went from being top of the class in my previous school to about 25 in a class of thirty. Spelling was my challenge. Every day we got twenty words to learn and their meaning. Every day we were tested in spelling by being given the first and last letter and the meaning. If you got more than two wrong you were belted. That was easy. Fridays was the real test. Every friday we were tested with a new twenty words and all the words from the previous two weeks...200 words in total. it seems that on a Friday I always got two or more wrong and was belted. On entering the senior school - I became a ferocious rugby player. I believe that rugby is the best anger therapy process that is socially acceptable. When the school made me head boy I was honoured and surprised. That year I was 33rd in the Glasgow University bursary exam.

What did I learn? I learned that learning is about consistently working hard. I learned by doing this I could succeed. That, along with the core values I got from my parents is why I have succeeded. I remember trying to decide what to study at university. To those of you struggling with this choice I would say "it does not really matter a lot". Every profession needs motivated persons who can continuously learn and grow. If you can do that doors will open.

Lest you think everything in my life has been golden it has not. In 2001 I was CEO of a company that got caught in the tech downturn. We had to go through a re-packaged bankruptcy and when the market did not rebound fast enough they had to replace me to keep the banks happy. All of us experience some setbacks in life. Since then I have been an olive farmer in Italy, sort of, and today I continue to run two private businesses. I still love winning and building teams who know how to win.

If you are a pupil at Hutchie, even though it may be hard, you are incredibly lucky. Please try hard to take every advantage of this blessing."

School Memories

Former pupil Dorothy Humphreys' first introduction to the school was shortlived – she attended for just one day before War broke out! Here Dorothy née Diack (C1948) recalls her first day at Kingarth Street and how she eventually returned to Hutchie.

"It was 1st September 1939, a memorable day; a Friday. All the staff were trying to act as if it was just any old Friday. No one was fooled, apart from the little ones in the Garden School. We were given our timetables and the sewing teacher, Miss Anderson, said we must bring our materials 'next week' Germany had invaded Poland and two days later Britain declared war on Germany. The school closed on the Monday, by which time I had been sent to a schoolmaster friend of my father in the Leadhills to avoid the bombs. On the way there, the guard came through the train announcing we were now at war. Shortly afterwards, when the Blitz came, I returned to Glasaow, but Hutchie remained

closed so I was sent to Netherlee. As soon as Hutchie reopened, I returned there. I have a great respect for Hutchesons'. It was an excellent place of learning with wonderful staff. That taught



me more about teaching than I ever learned in my year at Jordanhill College. The greatest inspiration was from Rona P Macadam. She sailed along the top corridor like a "Ship – of – the – Line", all sails set – What a woman! The "Duchess", Ethel Mackay was also memorable; in fact, they all were! Best wishes to all in the school. I hope these current young people do not take their education for granted."

The Annual Fund 2016/17

The Annual Fund was launched in 2002 and is a yearly request to the whole Hutchesons' Community, both past and present, to make investment in the school and support a number of important projects which would not be possible without the generosity of fund supporters.

Hutchesons' focuses on academic excellence; our pupils consistently achieve superb exam results – in 2016 we saw a 68% pass rate at A grade and an overall 96.5% pass rate. They also excel in sport, music, drama and the arts and engage in a huge range of community projects and personal development programmes both at home and abroad.

Since its launch, the Annual Fund has raised over £1.6million, including £160,000 in the 2015-16 year. Whilst the majority of gifts have been allocated to the Bursary Fund, currently supporting 1 in 6 pupils in the Secondary School, Music, Drama, Art and Sports are among the departments which have also benefited from the generosity of the donors.

Rector's Vision

New Rector Mr Gambles has a clear vision of how to make the excellent Hutchie education even better – and improving facilities for the primary and S6 pupils is a top priority.

Mr Gambles is already very impressed with the School's facilities and resources but he knows that if the School is to remain at the forefront of Scottish Education, it always needs to be looking to the future.

He is full of praise for the Primary School which offers children a wonderful learning environment but he believes a programme of modernisation is essential to build further on its success.

He said: "I'm really keen to develop it. Kingarth Street feels like a proper school when you walk in - it's got that history and aura about it. It nicely blends the traditional with the modern and you just need to look at the hall and the library to recognise that. More modern facilities would further improve it and 10 years from now I would like to see the developed Primary School being the real centrepiece of Hutchesons'."

Opportunities

Mr Gambles also spoke of his desire to improve the S6 experience at Hutchesons' to build on the excellent opportunities that already exist for pupils in their final year.

He said: "Sixth year is a very special time at school; the pupils really mature and become much more independent. I would like to treat them more like adults in terms of the facilities we provide – whether that's a new 6th year centre or a redevelopment of their existing area. It could also be a shared facility between the staff and pupils which would further break down the barrier between teacher and pupil.

The other area of school life which is likely to benefit from investment in the near future is sport. Mr Gambles explained: "The school is currently carrying out a strategic sports audit which will help us identify exactly what we want to do with sport at Hutchie and improving our facilities. I think we are managing well the balance between rugby and other sports like hockey. The School does extremely well, competing very strongly in both of these sports and I hope to see it become even more successful in the coming years."

Mr Gambles' overall goal is for the School to score a perfect 10 in all areas and he believes maintaining strong links to the wider Hutchie community will ensure the School always achieves top marks

He said: "I know that former pupils and the parents are a wonderful resource and have so much experience to share. They've got knowledge and ideas which we should tap into to make

1957 New Boys Reunion

Two 1957 'New Boys' are planning to host a reunion for their classmates next September to mark the 60th anniversary of their start at the new junior school at Boleyn Road.

Tom Ross and Andy Matheson write:

"There is a long forgotten song some former pupils may remember that started:

'In 1650 the School began with twelve boys on the roll.

And they bent their will to the grim book drill for the good of body and soul.'

History may have been slightly revised by nine or so years since this ditty was committed to memory, but, for eighty boys, it was 1957 that was a much more important date in the history of Hutchie.

They were the first intake of pupils at the brand new Junior School at Boleyn Road. The Boys' Secondary School on Beaton Road was still a building site: the Girls' School at Kingarth Street a place far away of which they were supposed to know little.

The 1957 version of Primary Va, under Tom Neil, and Vx, under Alex Terries, had been born.

Memories

The eighty new boys, of course, had no real memories of Crown Street and the Gorbals - apart, perhaps, from sitting the entrance exam. Not for them the inkwells, the open fires, the Victorian desks or the outside toilets.

Next September, the sixtieth anniversary of that baptism of fire, with the help of the Development Office, we hope to organise a dinner in the school for as many of our former colleagues as we can manage.

an architectural firm called OBM, the idea of combining his vocation with his sport proved too great a temptation for Jim to resist.

Initially working for OBM on Saint Maarten, he moved in 1980 to Grand Cayman, eventually becoming a director with the firm. When the devastating hurricane Ivan crippled the islands, he was instrumental in much of the subsequent rebuilding programme, especially the schools. At the height of the storm he "hijacked" a generator from a building site to keep the Georgetown Hospital operating, the local power supply having been washed out by the wave which bisected the island.

In 2012 he was awarded a Queen's Certificate and a Badge of Honour for his work. At the time of his death he was deeply involved in two major government projects: the new cruise liner berthing facility and the redevelopment of the Owen Roberts Airport.

He is survived by his widow Donna and daughter Claire Isobel on Cayman and by his brothers Dr W Sinclair Scott (C1962) and Rev Donald Scott (C1975) and their families in Scotland.

Gordon M Lyall

Class of 1951 1932 - 2016 Gordon was born in November 1932 and attended Mount Florida primary school before starting at Hutchesons' in Crown



Street. He enjoyed his time in the school, doing well academically and earning his colours as a key member of the rowing team.

After leaving school, Gordon served an apprenticeship at Barclay Curle's Clydeholm Shipyard whilst studying at Glasgow University for a degree in Engineering (Naval Architecture). After graduating from Glasgow he took a post graduate course in Production Engineering at Imperial College, London.

In 1958, Gordon married his long time sweetheart, Morag, and on return from honeymoon found his National Service call up papers waiting. He joined the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers - an obvious appointment for a Naval Architect! - and was commissioned after officer cadet training in Aldershot. He was consequently posted to the Royal Military College of Science at Shrivenham and was joined there by Morag and new baby daughter Susan. Son Ian (C1981) completed the family four years later.

Having been demobbed, Gordon returned to Scotland and worked for a short time in shipbuilding. He then joined Simpson Lawrence, a prestigious marine engineering business based in Hillington, and joined the Board as Works Director and then as Technical Director - a position he held until his retirement in November 1996.

Throughout his life, Gordon had a love of the sea and of sailing. He was a gifted craftsman who built and maintained a number of boats.

Peter Robert Hitchins

Class of 1946 1930 - 2016

Peter won a bursary to attend Hutchesons' in 1940. He attended the school at Crown Street throughout the war years but left abruptly in 1946 to join the



Royal Navy, where he rose from boy seaman to Lieutenant, retiring in 1983. He was a precocious polymath, with wide interests in chemistry, biology, anatomy, physics and languages: he was said to be fluent in Greek at the age of eleven! Peter died on his 86th birthday at Bury St Edmunds, Suffolk, England. He is survived by two sons and two daughters.

Mrs Edith Margaret Telfer née Thompson

Class of 1946 | 1928 - 2016

Edith was in a group of Hutchie girls which went 'harvesting' in south west Scotland towards the end of the war, caught a yearn for the countryside, got a degree in Agriculture and held the post of Milk Officer of Roxburgh and Selkirk until her Marriage in 1954. Thereafter she was a Farmer's wife, firstly in a farm close to the border with Northumberland, and then in two farms in the West of Scotland.

George McIlwham

Class of 1944 | 1926 - 2016

George McIlwham was the Crown Street boy who forged a career in music, studying the unusual combination of flute and bagpipes. A characterful and perennially dapper man whose roots lay on Arran, George's business card included the line "Pipes & Piccolo". He delighted in the soubriquet "The Prodigal Piper.

He played with several major orchestras, including the Royal Scottish National Orchestra, and in the 1960s was a mainstay in the BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra.

Forever interested in life and people, George would sing or hum a tune at less than the drop of a veritable hat. A composer of some note, one of his pipe tunes was Waverley, both in honour of the paddle steamer of the same name, and the fact that he had on several occasions been ship's piper aboard the vessel (as had fellow Hutchie FP Gordon Casely).

He was a guest of the school in 2006, and greatly savoured his tour of the music department led personally by head of music Edgar Trotter. George's own compositions ranged from folk songs to arrangements of old Scots songs, to creating classical music and bagpipes tunes. A friend of the composer Sir Peter Maxwell Davies, George was regularly called on by Sir Max to perform the bagpipe solo "Sunrise", the concluding movement of the composer's symphony "Orkney Wedding". At a Last Night of the Proms at the Albert Hall, George electrified the audience by entering high above the orchestra, and making his way down to the front beside the conductor. In full Highland garb complete with plaid, George acknowledged the concluding ovation not by bowing, but by saluting!

George who was married to Muriel and had two sons and three grandchildren, died peacefully on June 23 at Westerton Care Home in Bearsden. Thanks to Gordon Casely for his tribute to a fellow Hutchesonian.

Rev Ian William Robertson

Class of 1944 1925 - 2016

lan was born on Brora Street, Riddrie, in Glasgow on the 18th of December 1925. He lived near Barlinnie prison, where his father worked for HMP Service, and first

attended Riddrie Primary School before moving on to attend Hutchesons' Grammar school.

On leaving school Ian was enlisted for National Service and served with the RASC until demobilisation in 1945/6. Ian served in mainland Europe during the Allied advance through occupied France and then Belgium.

Upon leaving the Army Ian attended Glasgow University where he completed a MA degree. He followed this by studying at New College, Edinburgh University, for his Bachelor of Divinity degree, which included a two-year scholarship to Marburg University in Germany.

lan's first Church of Scotland Ministerial appointment was as an assistant to the Minister of the rural parishes of Cranston, Crichton and Ford in Midlothian where he spent three years. During this time Ian and Irene, whom he had met whilst holidaying in Nairn, were married in 1957 at Rosebank Parish Church in Nairn.

Ian's first full charge was to Galston New Parish church in Ayrshire where he spent eight years and where his first two sons, David and John, were born. Tragically, John passed away aged thirteen months old.

In 1966 Ian took up a new challenge and moved to the parish of Queen's Park /Crosshill in Glasgow. Here he preached for eight years and during this time Ian and Irene had three further sons; Moray, Graham and Alastair.

In 1974 Ian and his family moved to his last charge of Colvend, Southwick and Kirkbean in rural Dumfries and Galloway. Here, Ian spent twenty

happy years in the wonderful Manse at Colvend. On retiring in 1995, at the age of seventy, Ian and Irene moved to Lochmaben, near Dumfries. Again, tragedy struck in 1996. Ian and Irene lost their first born son, David, who had fallen ill whilst living in Australia.

Robert C Cumming Class of 1939

1921 - 2015 Robert C. Cumming, passed away on 19th December, 2015, aged 94, after fifty-eight years

of happily married life to his wife Jean. He was educated at Hutchesons' Grammar School, after which he went on to Glasgow University where he took a Law degree. He joined the Royal Bank of Scotland where,

in time, he moved up to become Senior Executive Director of the Bank before retiring.

Outside of banking he served on a number of voluntary organisations including, amongst others, being treasurer of the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh, from whom he was awarded an Hon. Fellowship. He was also chairman of the English Speaking Union, as well as treasurer of the Royal Scottish Geographical Society.

Robert and Jean enjoyed travelling, visiting many far-flung places including the Arctic, the Antarctic, Australia and New Zealand, as well as the Middle and Far East. Robert also enjoyed photography and fishing and was a long standing member of Bruntsfield Golf Club. He was blessed with good health throughout his long life and it was only latterly he was less mobile.
